The ICUDDR Vision: Filling the Gap in University-Based Addictions Training

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The Global Context

- Scientific research is being translated to the workforce
- Addiction remains misunderstood, resulting in nonevidence based practices for treatment and prevention
- Failure of non-scientific interventions results in loss of public confidence in the field

Conclusion: Need enhanced efforts to prepare the addictions workforce

The Global Context

- Addiction Prevention and Treatment is **not recognized as a unique field**; incorporated within other disciplines:
 - <u>Treatment</u>: psychology, public health, medicine, social work, nursing
 - <u>Prevention</u>: psychology, public health, communications, education
- **Tangential and fragmented focus**; multidisciplinary specialization is lacking
- University consortium needed to shape the discipline and advocate for formal academic training programs in addiction studies

Evolution of ICUDDR

- Urgent need to <u>enhance professional</u> <u>workforce</u> in addiction services
- Growing need for <u>advanced/specialized</u> <u>training</u> of addiction professionals
- <u>Lack of addiction studies programs</u> in university settings
 - Undergraduate
 - Graduate

History of ICUDDR

- <u>Key</u> question raised by university partners: **How to develop** academic programs in addictions studies?
 - How to create a new program/field of study?
 - How to create a demand in the marketplace?
- <u>March 2016</u> INL engaged Colombo Plan and OAS to organize a meeting of universities from Asia, Latin America, Middle East, North America, and Europe
- At the conclusion of the meeting, participants decided to <u>formalize a</u> <u>network</u>: **International Consortium of Universities for Drug Demand Reduction (ICUDDR)**

Goals of ICUDDR

- **Network Development**: Establish a network of universities with academic programs in addiction studies
- **Education**: Engage students in addiction studies programs and continuing education
- **Research**: Advance applied research in addiction prevention and treatment

Goals of ICUDDR

- **Community Outreach**: Enhance university partnerships with addiction professionals, and research and practice communities
- Advocacy
 - <u>Within universities</u> to develop academic programs in addiction studies
 - <u>Guidelines and standards</u> for academic programs in addiction studies

Next Steps for ICUDDR

- Expand network of universities
 - Those implementing programs
 - Those interested in implementing programs
- Assess needs of ICUDDR members
- **Disseminate curricula** (e.g., UPC/UTC) and other information about academic programs
- Host **3rd Annual Conference**: June 4-5, 2018 in San Diego
